

HONORED CITIZEN DIES.

Respected American of Foreign Birth
Passes to the Other Shore.

When Henry Lutman migrated to America in 1866, and later to Sheridan township in 1899, this country secured a good man, an industrious, thrifty, intelligent German who became a thorough American in love with his adopted country. His residence of twenty-eight years in Poweshock were years of success and prosperity and many friends mourn his loss.

Henry John Lutman was born November 7, 1842, in Hanover, Germany, and died June 4th, 1910, in Chester township. He was a son of Louis and Lizzie Lutman. He came to this country in 1866 and found employment in Cincinnati, Ohio. In 1869 he came to Poweshock county, Iowa, spending two years in Sheridan township and then located in Chester where he spent his time in agricultural work.

In December, 1868 in Ohio, Mr. Lutman was married to Mrs. Allyne Hagedorn, also of Hanover, Germany who passed away October 8, 1902. There are three children: Louis, Sophia, and Mrs. Otto Schultz, and Henry; also 11 grandchildren. The deceased made his home with his son, Henry, for the last 16 years. He enjoyed good health up to the last 22 years when bronchial trouble set in and he never regained his health. He was an enthusiastic member of the German Lutheran church of Malcom township.

The funeral was held from the Henry Lutman home Saturday, June 4, at 10 o'clock, conducted by Rev. O. C. Biermann. The body was then taken to the church yard at the Lutheran church in Malcom township where his remains were laid to rest by the side of his wife.
