The Oriental Commandery. numbering seventy-five members from Newton came in a special train chartered for the purpose that they might be present and act as escore to the funeral cortege.

He was of Scotch-Irish parentage, and was the eighth of a family of ten children, six of whom survive him. He was marrired to Madge M. Douglas of Crinnell, Iowa, on the tile day of March, 1908. To this union was born one child-little Frances, yet scarcely three years of age, whose Hiale life is too tander to realize the soryow that has come into the hearts or her mother and the prothers and sic ters.

Frank's was always a generous and social disposition, full of mirth for those who were happy, yet as sympathetic and tender as a woman to those who were in need of human assistance. To know him was to place nim on the list of closest friendship. He was a poor boy and yet his devotion to his mother, his loyalty to his friends and his determination and integrity in business won for him a place in life that many a boy starting out under more favorable conditions in life has failed to attain to. In fact his life having been spent entirely in this community, is a living example of the fact that a cheerfuul disposition, a sympethetic heart and a determination of purpose in tife are good heritage: bystowed on them.
