Death Calls G. W. Mart

Long Time Resident of Grinnell Dies Wednesday Nght At An Advanced Age

WOULD HAVE BEEN 81 YEARS OLD ON JAN. 26

Mr. Mart Was Born in Kentucky and Came to Grinnell to Make His Home in 1892

G. W. Mart died at his home on Main street, Grinnell, Wednesday evening, January 4. He was the son of Albert C. and Eveline Mart, and was born Jan. 21, 1852 in Wallonia, Ky. He lived there till he was five years of age, then moved to Henderson, Ky., which was his home till coming to Grinnell in 1892. He was foreman of the paint shops for the Spaulding company when they were doing an enormous buggy and carriage business here.

Mr. Mart was married to Mollie Lee Rose Oct. 30, 1879. Five children were born to this home. The first two died in infancy, John Lee and George Dixson. After her death he seemed to take little interest in the affairs of life. He said many times that he had lived his life and had done his work, and was ready to go.

Mr. Mart was the last of eleven children to depart this life. He was a good business man. and had many friends. For the past year be had suffered a great deal from heart trouble, and for the past week had been very low.
