Mary Agnes Murphy was born on December 8, 1859 in Louisa County, near Muscatine, and came with her parents to Mahaska County, when a little over a year old. The family moved by team from near Muscatine, to a house in Sugar Grove neighborhood, where they lived until a pioneer home could be built on the prairie land two miles north and a little west of New Sharon. This land her father purchased from the U. S. Government at one dollar and twenty five cents per acre. Here she grew to young womanhood, helping her parents in every way with the tasks of home making, always willing and ready to assist her parents.

She was married to Peter Martin at the Catholic Church in Searsboro, April 27, 1898, and lived all her married life in Searsboro, ever a kind neighbor and friend. To this union were born two daughters and a son, Marie, Agnes, and Louie. Her last sickness had been long drawn out. Nine years ago it was discovered that cancer, the deadly enemy of human life, had fastened its fangs into her system. things well. She passed away Monday morning, June 10, 1929 at 6:55 aged 69 years, 6 months, and 2 days. At 10:00 Wednesday, June 12, High Mass was held in St. Brendan's Church in Scarsboro, by Rev M. J. Hannon, the pastor. Father Hannon's sermon gave a glowing tribute to Mrs. Martin's unselfish life, her devotion to her family, loyalty to her church and country. He spoke of her friend-liness and kindness to the priests, who came to hold services in the Searsboro church, and of her kindness to everyone. She was a good Christian and a practical Catholic, practicing and professing her religion at all times, ever a model to all who knew her. Father Hannon gave a beautiful explanation of the Catholic doctrine of prayer for the dead, showing that it was a practice of olden times.—that it is a truly wholesome thought to pray for the dead, a beautiful doctrine and well founded. His sermon was a source of deep comfort to the sorrowing family, and a wonderful inspiration to every one hearing it.

Mrs. Martin is survived by her devoted husband and six children: Agnes, Louie, Marie (Mrs. Orville Gilbert), Ed., John, and Frank, who in loving solicitude ministered to her with touching devotion, and who will hallow her memory in prayerful remembrance. She also leaves one brother, John Murphy, of Minneapolis, Minn. nine grandchildren, and a host of relatives and friends. Interment was made in Calvary Cemetery, Searsboro, the final blessing at the grave being given by Rev. M. J. Hannon.
