Another Montezuma Citizen Answers

W. M. Messick, well known citizen of Montezuma, died very suddenty at his home early Priday morning. He had been a taithful and trusted employe of the King-Read Immber Co, for some time and quit his work Thursday afternoon in apparent good health. He had asked for and received permission to take a vacation on the following day, that he and his wite might attend the 25th wedding anniversary of Mr. and Mrs. G. G. Wilson, nephew and niece of deceased.

He was feeling well at night and about 2 o'clock got out of bed and attended to the fire in the heater. An hour later he was up again thinking it was time to arise and prepare for the trip to Grinnell. When he found it was a little past three he retired. Shortly, the wife noticed something wrong and arising found him close to death's door. A physician was harriedly "ummoned but before he arrived the dark curtain was drawn.

The deceased was a good citizen, a kind husband and a considerate father. A hard worker he found pleasure in accepting the most difficult task and was content to carry the burden without complaint. He had a sympathetic heart and was ever ready to respond to the extent of his ability in time of need or discress and he always desired to be on the right side.

W. M. Messick was born in Jonesville, Yadkin county, North Carolina, April 27, 1850, and died at his home in Monteguma, December 19, 1913, aged 63 years, 7 months and 22 days. He was a former resident of Lynnville and Searshoro moving to Montezuma in 1884 where he has since resided. In 1279 Le was married to Mary E. Adkins. Five children were born to this union, four sons, Chas. A., of Galt, lowa, Elmer C., George Leroy, William Clifford, of Montezuma. One daughter, Nellie May, passed away in 1897. Mr. Messick was converted and united Tith the M. P. church in 1889 and remained a faithful member until the class was disbanded and the church sold. Of recent years he has attended the services of the Methodist church and was a member of the Men's Bible class. He is the first one to pass away since its present organization and as a mark of esteem the class attended the funeral services in a hody.
