John Sample Miller was born Nov. 4, 1846, near Cambridge, Guernsey County, Ohio, and died at his home in Grinnell, Iowa, Tuesday evening, September 7, 1926, survived by his wife and one son.

Mr. Miller's parents, Joseph W and Margaret McGregor Miller, were of Scotch-Irish descent, thereby giving the assurance of worthy ancestry. In 1851 the parents with their family moved to Illinois, and lived near Monmouth, Warren County, until after the close of the Civil War.
