MRS. MARY HOLLOWAY

Was Descended in the Direct Line from Colonial Ancestors.

SIX GREAT-GRANDFATHERS
IN REVOLUTIONARY WAR

Passed Away Saturday After a Residence of Many Years in Grinnell.

Mary Charlotte Pike was born at Lawrenceburg, Indiana, the eldest daughter of George Washington Pike and Prudence Jane Ross. She was of Scotch, Irish and English ancestry, a descendant of early colonists who were actively associated with the history of this country ever since her ancestor, Robert Pike, came to America in 1635 Six great-grandfathers served in the Revolutionary War, one of whom, Col. Zebulon Pike, after raising and equipping a company with his own earnings, fought at times under the immediate command of General Washington and later on was visited by General Lafayette at Lawrenceburg, Indiana.

Her grandparents and parents were among the earliest pioneers of Iowa, settling near Ottumwa where she grew to beautiful womanhood. After her marriage to Mearis C. Holloway she lived many years near Jefferson, Iowa, on a farm which still bears mute testimony to her love of beautiful shrubs and trees. To this union were born five daughters, Mrs. Maud Livingston, Mrs. LaReine Bishop, Mrs. Grace Hornick, Nelle and Georgiana Holloway.

For many years she had made her home in Grinnell, uniting soon after arriving with the Congregational church.

Mrs. Holloway was a woman of noble character. Though an invalid for the past eleven years, years full of bodily suffering, her spirit remained indominable. In disposition she was meek, gentle and retiring but always full of hope and cheer. Although naturally unusually active mentally and physically, yet the years of her invalidism passed happily because of a love of books, especially of poetry, and because of a constant interest in the daily activities of her family. Only those who were closest to her realize how great was her patience, unselfishness and optimism to the very hour of her death.
