Death Summons Charles G. Macy In Lynnville

Lynnville, Ia., Dec. 10, Special: Charles Gordon Macy, son of Lilburn and Martha Gordon Macy, was born in Spiceland, Ind., Oct. 12, 1864, and died at his home in Lynnville, Dec. 5, 1935, aged 71 years, one month and 23 days. He lived in Indiana until 1880 when the family moved to Lynnville. He and his brother. He was one of the pioneer citizens of the community and contributed his share to the building of the country. He was a quiet, unassuming man, honest, honorable and respected by all. He was a lifaithful, loyal, kind husband and a lifather who loved his family and this home.
