

## Death Summons

### Charles G. Macy

### In Lynnville

1935

Lynnville, Ia., Dec. 10, Special:  
Charles Gordon Macy, son of  
Lilburn and Martha Gordon Macy,  
was born in Spiceland, Ind., Oct.  
12, 1864, and died at his home in  
Lynnville, Dec. 5, 1935, aged 71  
years, one month and 23 days. He  
lived in Indiana until 1880 when  
the family moved to Lynnville. He  
and his brother, Horace, made the  
trip from Indiana to Lynnville in  
a covered wagon, bringing a load  
of household goods. Oscar Macy, a  
cousin, made the trip with the two  
boys, the rest of the family coming  
by train.

Charles attended Spiceland Acad-  
emy and the Friends Academy at  
Lynnville. He was united in mar-  
riage to Sadie Rolis in 1901. To  
this union seven daughters were  
born, Lois Fouch of Monroe, Ia.,  
Berdene Wingfield, Ellen Hanson,  
Emma, Mae and Lenora, all of  
Lynnville. Mary Blatterblaurn pre-  
ceded him in death, April 7, 1934.

He had a birthright membership  
in the Friends church, in which  
faith he continued until his death.  
He had been in poor health for a  
long time, but for two weeks prior  
to his sudden death he had seemed  
to be in better health and spirits  
than usual.

He was one of the pioneer citi-  
zens of the community and con-  
tributed his share to the building  
of the country. He was a quiet, un-  
assuming man, honest, honorable  
and respected by all. He was a  
faithful, loyal, kind husband and a  
father who loved his family and  
his home.

He leaves to mourn his depar-  
ture his wife and six daughters and  
six grandchildren, two brothers,  
Henry Macy of Des Moines and  
Walter Macy of Orient, Wash.,  
two sisters, Mrs. Grace Forsyth of  
Orient, Wash., and Mrs. Ed For-  
syth of Colfax, a number of nieces,  
nephews and other relatives. Those  
of his brothers and sisters who pre-  
ceded him in death are Horace  
Macy of Lynnville, Mrs. Ida Pem-  
berton of Oskaloosa, Emma King  
and Alice Newby.

Charles will be missed by a host  
of friends who have known him  
throughout the years.

Funeral services were held from  
the Friends church Saturday after-  
noon in charge of Rev. George  
Woods. Music was furnished by a  
mixed quartet composed of Mes-  
dames Will Allee and Harvey  
Gause and A. T. Gifford and Char-  
lie Potter, with Mrs. A. T. Gifford  
at the piano. Pallbearers were  
nephews. Burial was in the Friends  
cemetery east of town.
