Educator, Dies

Budd S. Moyle, 78, resident
of Mayrlower Home, died early this morning (Monday) at a lo-cal hospital following an ex-

tended illness.

Memorial services will be held Thursday at 2 p.m. from the James-Schalinske Funeral Home with the Rev. Chester Custer, pastor of the Methodist church officiating. Those de-siring may contribute to the Methodist church building fund.

The youngest son of Joseph James and Ida North Moyle, he was born in Washington county on Aug. 2nd, 1884. He moved with his family to Lenox, Iowa. at an early age where he was graduated from high school. He received his B.A. degree from Tarkio College, Tarkio, Mo. and his M.A. degree from the University of Missouri.

Moyle entered the teaching profession, serving two years at Onslow, Iowa, as principal; two years at Anamosa as high school principal and coach: five years at LaPorte City as superintendent of schools: and 16 years at Maquoketa as superintendent where he organ-

ized the Junior College.

In 1940 he was elected from Jackson county to the Iowa Legislature and served two terms. He was active in school legislation and was on the School Code Commission which improved the educational standards and teacher welfare of Iowa, Also, he served as publie relations director of Iowa Education Association.

In 1911, he was married to his college sweetheart. Bessie Brown, who preceded him in death in 1940. To this union were born two daughters. Margaret Moyle Butler of Lompoc. Calif., and Ruth Moyle Henerlider of Cleveland, Ohio. There

are three grandchildren.
In 1943, he was married to
Lenora K. Hartmann of Marengo. He retired in 1957 and they took up residence at the Mayflower Home in Grinnell.
