It was the Official Board of the Grinne.. Methodist church that recommended him for admission into the Iowa Conference of the Methodist Church. where he was admitted on trial in 1896. With the exception of one year, he continued in active service until 1940. In September, 1918. Lealth conditing. caused him to take a year's leave of absence, during which time he lived in Davenport and again worked at his old trade as a molder until September, 1919, when he again returned! to the active ministry.

From 1923-1925 he served as chaplain of the Iowa State Penitentiary at F'. Madison. He with his wife had previously taught in the prison night school while serving as pastor of the Santa Fe Avenue Methodist chuch.

In 1925 he returned to the pastoral ministry in which he continued until he reached the retirement age of 72. He then continued to serve for two more. years until the rules of the church forced him to locate. In 1942 at the age of 74 years, he returned to Grinnell, where they had previously purchased property at 1008 West Street.
