Double Interment in Hazelwood Cemetery Today for Mr. and Mrs. Joseph McCaulley.

DEATH DIVIDED THEM LESS THAN 24 HOURS

Mr. and Mrs. McCaulley Were Iowa Pioneers and Former Grinnell Residents.

The death of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph McCaulley at Victor this week removes from life two tried and true Iowa pioneers who have given much to upbuild its material interests.

Joseph McCaulley was a son of John and Rebecca McCaulley and was born in Chio on Oct. 27, 1843. He departed this life on March 5, 1924, aged 30 years, 4 months and 6 days.

His parents removed to Iowa in 1846, settling in Davis county, and in 1849 the father went to California with the other seekers for gold. Joseph McCaulley grew to young manhood in Davis county and at the age of 18 enlisted in the service of his country as a member of Company E, Third Iowa Cavalry. He served to the close of the war, participating in the campaigns in Missouri, Arkansas, Tennessee, Mississippi and Alabama, also taking part in Shernan's March to the Sea.

At the close of the war he returned to Davis county and on Dec. 29, 1865, was united in marriage to Miss Harriet Jane Smith. He took up farming and continued that occupation in Davis county until 1884 when he and his amily moved to Tama county, residng there for 12 years. He then (Continued on Page Five)
