Funeral Of A Beloved Grinnell Woman Held Wednesday. 7437

Funeral services for Mrs. G. B. McGuin, who passed away Monday afternoon at a local hospital, were held Wednesday afternoon at the Congregational church, conducted by Rev. Robert Inglis. Mrs. Margery Bounia and Mrs. E. B. T. Spencer sang two songs. "One Sweetly Solemn Thought" and "Pock of Ages." Pall bearers were A. M. Burton, Walter Neely, John Peters, J. G. Mrs. McGuin sustained a proken aip and wrist in her home on January 20 and was getting along accely when she suffered a stroke Febmary 7 from which death resulted.

Mrs. Olive Emelia McGuin, daughter of Jens C. Olson and Mary Kruse Olson, both of whom came to this country from Denmark, was born at Amery, Wis., April 20, 1865. She was a teacher for a time. She married George B. McGuin in 1886 and the young couple settled in Brooklyn that year and moved to Grunnell in 1888. For a great many years prior to Mr. McGuin's death in 1927 he was assistant postmaster in Grinnell. Two children were born to this union, Mrs. E. E. (Flora) Lind. atrony of Montezunia and Mrs. Guy Maryl Goranch of Grinvell who survive her with three grandchildcen.
