

LONG AND USEFUL LIFE IS ENDED

Mrs. Frances Nye McHose Passed
Away June 9, at Dillon, Mon-
tana.

HAD GONE WEST TO ATTEND
GRANDSON'S GRADUATION.

Mrs. McHose Had Made Her Home in
Grinnell For Many Years—Many
Friends Miss Her.

Frances Nye McHose was born at
Fairfield, Maine, December 7, 1842.
There she spent most of her girlhood.
She came west with her family to
Geneseo, Illinois and lived there until
her marriage to Samuel McHose in
1865. To Mr. McHose's children by
a former marriage, she proved herself
a true mother.

Mrs. McHose had three sons of her
own; Arthur Alden now of Boone,
Iowa, Charles Edward of Frazer, Iowa,
and Harry H. of Broadwater, Mon-
tana.

The McHose family moved to Grin-
nell in 1879, and have been favorably
known in this community. The boys
all attended the public schools and
Harry is a graduate of Grinnell Col-
lege.

Although importuned by her chil-
dren to come and live with them after
Mr. McHose's death ten years ago,
Mrs. McHose was so attached to Grin-
nell and to Grinnell friends that she
insisted on continuing to make her
home here. Her neighbors and friends
speak of her uniformly brave and
cheery outlook on life and her kindly
and helpful interest in the people
around her. She enjoyed reading and
was unusually well informed upon
current events. Her guests always
found her interesting.

She was a member of the Home De-
partment of the Congregational Sun-
day School and enjoyed its social
gatherings and other activities.

During these last years, her interest
has centered about the life of her
children and grand-children and it
may fairly be said that her care for
them was generously reciprocated. She
was on her way to attend Commence-
ment at the University of Montana
where her grandson, Harold McHose
was to graduate, when an attack of
heart failure brought to a close a long,
useful, unselfish and happy life. She
died at Dillon, Montana, June 9, 1924.

Burial will take place at the old
home at Geneseo, Illinois.

Funeral services were held at 10:30
o'clock this morning from the Meilott
Undertaking Parlors.
