Agnes Wiley was born in Bally Watermoy, County Antrim, Ireland, May 10, 1847, and died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Ella Wornick, Geddes, S. D., Feb. 23, 1915, at the age of 67 Wyears, 9 months and 13 days.
