Notwithstanding the blinding snow storm of last Sunday a large company of friends and neighbors in the vicinity of Brooklyn turned to follow the remains of J. C. Melirath to their last resting place in the I. O. O. F. cemetery. About two months ago he suffered a nervous break down and notwithstanding all that human help could do was given him he gradually grew weaker and on last Thursday forenoon while visiting at the home of his brother, Hugh McIlrath near Carnforth, he committed suicide by hanging in a corn crib.
