Dies in Grinnell**

William, son of Robert J. and Sarah Swain McLain, was born in Scott Township, Poweshiek County, Iowa, Dec. 19, 1879, and passed away in a Grinnell Nursing Home on Dec. 1, 1968, at eighty-eight years of age.

In his youth he attended rural school and Deep River High School.
