

C. M. Nisewander Of Brooklyn Passes Away

He didn't play for the dance as was first expected, but called some of the square dances and joined in both the square and round dances himself.

About 10 o'clock he motioned from across the floor to Mrs. Nisewander and said he wanted to go home as he was not feeling well. She asked Charles Downey and Friend Kensinger to help him home. He only lived a few minutes after arriving at his home.

The community was much shocked by Mr. Nisewander's sudden death. He had been apparently in good health and at work in his filling station every day. He was unusually jolly and seemed to feel very well at the dance until his attack.

He was a good husband and father and kind neighbor and friend. He will be greatly missed not only by his family but by the whole community. He leaves his wife, one son, Perle of Grinnell, and three daughters, Mrs. Mike Bolen of Malcom, Mrs. Wayne Frizzell and Mrs. Guy Brannian, and several granddaughters.
