A GOOD MAN GONE HOME.

E. T. Palmer died at the soldiers' home in Marshalltown, to which he had gone with his wife in 1890 on Tuesday, Dec. 2, at the age of 60 years.

In 1864 he was united in marriage to Mrs. H. T. Parvin, who with their three children, Mrs. C. J. Schesler, of Marshalltown, C. W. Palmer of San Francisco, and Ethelbert T. Palmer of Marshalltown, survive him.

Mr. Palmer lived in Westfield before the war. When the war broke out he enlisted in the Fourth Iowa Cavalry. He came to Grinnell in 1865 and lived here with his family until 1892, when he went to Ness City, Kansas. While living in Grinnell he was well and favorably known as a hard working blacksmith who was interested in all the activities of the city. He was a good friend and neighbor, an indulgent husband and father.

The funeral services were conducted at the Home by Chaplain Jesse Cole who took for his subject, "A Good Man Gone Home." His body was brought to Grinnell on Thursday and was met at the depot by the Masons, who conducted it to the cemetery where the beautiful and impressive ritualistic service of the order was given.
