Parish, and for the next eight years her some was on a farm in the town of Chaster. Later, after a year in Jolorado, the family home was for i few years in Toledo, and during this period, in 1965, she joined the United Brethern Church in that town from which church she never removed her membership. Since 1908 her home has been in Grinnell in the house where she died. During all these years of her married life she has been a true home maker for her

tuscatal and for those of his chiliran who had not yet made their two homes, and a loving grandmothr to the many little ones of the amily connection.

She enjoyed good health and kept up an active and vigorous life during all these years, until March, 1919, when the trouble which ended her earthly activity first showed itself. A surgical operation at the famous hospital in Rochester, Minnesota, failed to effect a cure; and months of distressing illness and suffering have followed. She bore all with great patience and cheerfulness, making a brave fight against the inevitable, until death mercifully gave her release from pain and weakness on the evening of Wednesday, September 3, 1919. The funeral services were held at the home in Grinnell, Friday, September 5. at two p. m., conducted by Professor Charles No-The burial was at Hazelwood ble. Cemetery.

Mrs. Parish is survived by three brothers, K. J. Ensminger, of Bainbridge, Ohio; M. P. Ensminger, of Alamela, Calif.; and Charles Ensminger, of Joliet, Illinois, and two sisters, Mrs. C. B. Renna, who with the sister, Miss Clara Ensminger, have tenderly cared for her during the months of suffering, her memory will be precious to the children and grandchildren of Mr. Parish to whom she, for twenty-three years, has stood in the place of mother and grandmother, and to many friends and neighbors who have known and valued her qualities as a good woman and a kindly, helpful
