In 1884 he was married and bought the farm where he resided until his death. He united with the Congregational church o this place when a fouth, and never come of to an other.

Two years ago he was stricken with paralysis, from which he never ehilding faith. In one of his last letters he wrote. "We are all, the best of us faulty creatures. Our Father in beaver knows it, but He has greater over than we can comprehend. We may that the life beyond is immeasurable better than this one. Our bible termines us all that is necessary for this life.
