She was born at Victor, New York, to Philo and Phoabe Fornam Parks on November drst, 1840, the third in a family of live children. Seehnry heads and onportainity her father moved west with his family in 1856 and settled on a .arm on the outskirts of Gring-II, buyno been attracted to this community w its educational and relimens adantages. Miss Parks often recalled hat when the family drove into town n the old Iowa City stage coach, she vas first greeted by a tall girl, whom ve all know now as Mrs. H. D. Works. Their first evening was spent at the prayermeeting which was led by Dr. folvoke.

In 1857 the Parks family united with he Congregational church, and for the past sixty-six years Miss Parks has been a faithful attendant and oyal member, always ready to give uch Christian service as she has been able to give. She attended the public school and later was a student in Iowa College, to which her father had given forty acres of his Jasper County farm. She belonged to the famous class of 165 of which Mrs. R.
