Lucia Estella Peirce was born July 25, 1868, on the family farm southeast of Grinnell. She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. G. C. Peirce, wellknown and prominent pioneer residents of this community. About 1892 the family moved to Grinnell to take advantage of the educational facilities offered by the college. The family home was first at 1023 West street and later in the home which stood at the present location of the Community hospital.

Miss Peirce graduated from college in 1889. She taught for a time in the Grinnell schools and later in Menominee, Wis., and Boise, Idaho. About 1900 she returned to Grinnell and has made her home here ever since,

Miss Peirce was a widely read and cultured woman, a

lover of music and good books. For a great many years she was one of the leading spirits in the Historical and Literary club, of which she had been a member since May, 1899, or 51 years.
