## Old Soldier Is Called

William H. Peters was born March 1844, in Hamburg, Germany, and departed this life March 23, 1928, aged 84 years and 19 days. In 1861, when still a boy, he left his native country for America, settling first in Frankfort, Ill., where he was invested with the rights and privileges of an American Citizen.

His loyalty to his adopted country was proven in the following year when he enlisted in Company F, 64th Illinois Infantry and served the Northern Cause faithfully and well throughout the four long, dark years of the Civil War. His varied experiences in this great war did more than anything else to give him that pride and love for his new country which he has always Those war time stories manifested. which were told around his areside and to which his relatives and asignbors so often gathered to listen will live as long as memory for him shall last. And just as he was a faithful soldier during the war, so he became in ardent member of the Grand Army of the Republic after the war. His membership has always been with the Post in Grinnell.

At the close of the war, Mr. Peters came to Grinnell, lowa, and for many means thereafter was a farmer in this vicinity. February 22, 1866, he was coined in marriage to Miss Jane Eberharr and to them were corn thriteen shildren, five of whom died in infancy: those who survive are William F Peters, Turner, Iowa: Mrs. A. D. Douglass, Malcom, fowa; Frank T. Paters and George C. Peters of Brooklyn. Jowat Mrs B. B. Keyes of Burrank. Children Fred H. Peters of Princeton. Occaon: Charles Z. Peters of Grinnell. Funeral services were held in Frankfort. Ill., at the home of Mrs. Max Haas, conducted by Rev. Mr. Gerhold. The body was then brought to Grinnell and further services were held at the home of Mr. Peters' niece. Mrs. Mary Furber, and conducted by Rev. George Blagg of the Methodist church. Six grandsons bore the remains of their aged grandfather to its last earthly resting place, there to await the final resurrection.
