It is with sincere regret that the terald chronicles the death of S. J reston, whose passing away occurred uesday evening, January 6. Mr. Presn was a man of more than usual vergy, a pusher for everything that as good, one of the men who gave of he best he had to make Grinnell a ve, growing, progressive fown. In ie days of his physical strength and usiness activity no man did more ian he, and few did as much to aid in lovements for the advancement of rinnell interests. If any enterprise /as started needing a booster Mr. reston was always one of the first nd his enthusiasm, interest and efert always attracted others and seured their aid.

With all his quick, active, earnest ature he was one of the kindliest of en, with a warm, generous heart. ever failing to make friends, and ways giving freely and largely to eeded benevolences. In business he as the soul of honesty and in all his ausactions everything was done "on onor." If he made mistakes they ere few and in a long life of constently doing the right, useful and eeded things, any mistake was quickforgotten. As he advanced in age ad retired from more active life, he ever lost his interest in progressive covements, the less active in aiding iem. His friendship was a thing to · held in high esteem and his interest a public enterprise was always a rong force in aiding its progress.

Samuel Jackson Preston was born Hornellsville, N. Y., Sept. 3, 1832. e. came of Revolutionary stock, his candiather having fought in the war f independence. At the age of four lost his mother, his father surving till 1878.

In the year 1857 Mr. Preston, at the 25 of 25, moved to Scott County was and engaged in farming. On farch 28, 1858, he was married to Aliss ary Angusta La Grange, who surves him. Mr. Preston followed farming successfully in Scott County for twelve ears. In 1869 he moved to Grinnell, there he bought a farm, which he will will be and operated for some years to always loved the ground and eneavored to produce the very best reults always from his labor, and this haracteristic was most prominent in is like to the very end, and even beore his death he had systematically rranged for his spring work and his arden in a most perfect manner.

In 1870 he established the grocery usiness on the site on Main street, where it has been carried on ever ince by himself, by F. O. Proctor and trant Ramsey. In-1877 he built the reston Opera House, which his musual business efficiency carried brough a successful existence. For ive years, from 1891, he conducted the reston Hotel, on Commercial Street; fter which he refired from active usiness pursuits.

It will thus be seen that Mr. Prestor vas an active, energetic, successfu' aan of business; and it may be added hat he was a man who had the confi ence of his associates and fellow citiens, and a man who gave freely of his nergy, his time and his means to pub ic service. He served twice on th louncil, and was Chairman of the first Vater Committee. He was especially nterested in Fire Protection; was Fire thief at the time of the great Grinnel ire, and was keenly interested, very hortly before his death, in the inspec ion of the new auto fire truck. H. vas a man of independent judgmen nd resolute purpose, a man who stood four square to all the winds that dow." He died of apoplexy, almos! ustantaneously and without apparent uffering.

One of his very last acts, only arour or two before he died, was the seding and bedding down of his aithful old gray horse, which he had wined for nearly thirty-five years any which he had always been anxious to give the very kindest and best treatment that was possible. He was a mary who always loved animals and loved ill that was best in nature, and will be dissed by those who knew him, but specially by those who knew him best.

The funeral was held at the home esterday afternoon conducted by Rev. Charles Noble. Old-time friends served as bearers, W. C. Rayburn, G. M. Inristian, C. N. Dawley, G. H. Hamlin I. I. Davis and A. McIntesh.
