Mrs. Ray was one of the six

Harris Haines, who were connected closely with the very beginning of Grinnell Mr. Haines,
was a pioneer lawyer of statewide prominence and his wife,
who came to Grinnell as a girl
in a covered wagon, was a woman of exceptional character
and ability, loved and honored
through all her long life. Both
Mr. and Mrs. Haines graduated
from Grinnell college in the
class of 1885.

Theirs was a large and brilliant family. The only survivors
now are Charles, a lawyer in
Denver. Colorado, and Mary,

Sarah Haines, known as Sadie to all her friends, was born
in Grinnell May 30, 1873. Last

She grew up in Grinnell to be

G. Ray, who gained prominence

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both as superintendent of the Grinnell schools, and as the vetteran publisher of The Grinnell Herald, immediate ancestor of the present Herald-Register.

The last act of his life was to sign the papers which activated the merger of The Grinnell Herald and The Grinnell Register which became effective on Feb. 1, although, because of Mr. Ray's death, it was not formally announced until Feb. 13.

To Mr. and Mrs. Ray three children were born, Willard H. Harriet, now Mrs. Arthur Mc-Murray of Des Moines, is the only survivor. Willard, who won success in the oil business in Norfolk, Va., died a number of years ago.
