Old Time Resident Of Sheridan Passes

Mrs. Lucy Reams, a resident of Tama for the past fifteen years and prior to her coming to this city a resident of north Poweshiek county for nearly seventy years, died at her home at 2:00 o'clock Thursday afternoon, after an illness of several weeks duration.

The funeral services were held at the home Saturday morning at 10:00 o'clock, conducted by Dr. DeWitt Clinton, assisted by Rev. R. G. Smith. Music was furnished by Mrs. Carl B. Harrison, Ben Jones and Mr. and Mrs. C. J. Wonser, with Mrs. F. E. Fowler at the organ. A favorite hymn of the deceased, "I Would Not Live Alway," was sung by the quartet, after which Mr. Jones sang "Beautiful Isle of Somewhere." "The pall bearers were two sons of the deceased, J. W. Reams and W. W. Reams; two nephews, Allan and Preston Reams; and two grandsons, Wayne and Ralph Reams. Many beautiful flowers covered the casket. eloquently expressing the regard and sympathy of the donors. Interment was in the Sheridan cemetery, where there was a large attendance of friends from the neighborhood in which the greater part of Mrs. Reams' life had been spent.

Lucinda Jane Graham was born in Clearfield county, Pennsylvania, July 10, 1838, and died April 28, 1927, aged, eight-eight years, nine months and eighteen days. She came to Iowa in her youth and was married in Richland township, Tama county, December 4, 1864, to James Cloyd Reams, a veteran of the Union army in the Civil War.

Mr. and Mrs. Reams began their married life on a farm in Madison township, Poweshiek county, locating on a farm in Sheridan township in that county in 1868. There they reared their family and made their home for forty-four years, retiring from the farm and taking up their residence in Tama in 1912, and continuing to live here until the death of Mr. Reams April 18, 1918, and of Mrs Reams last week. They celebrated their golden wedding anniversary, surrounded by their children and a company of neighbors and friends, at their home in Tama on December '
