

## AGED WOMAN STRICKEN

Mrs. Artemissa Reed Dies Monday  
Forenoon Soon After Receiving  
Stroke of Paralysis. C-H

ARISING IN MORNING, SHE  
BEGINS HER WASHING

Calls Daughter at 10 O'Clock, Com-  
plains of Pain in Head, and  
Becomes Unconscious.

The death of Mrs. Artemissa Reed took place very suddenly Monday forenoon at 11:30 o'clock at her home, 721 Broad street, in this city. She had apparently been in remarkably good health until the time she was stricken.

When she arose Monday morning there was no warning of her speedy dissolution. She went about her Monday work as usual and started in to wash some clothes in the basement of her home.

At about 10 o'clock she called to her daughter, Miss Nessa, who was busy in the rooms above. When Nessa got to her mother, she was sitting down and complained of a severe hurting in the back of her head. She got worse rapidly, and the daughter ran to a neighbor for help. She soon got back, and found her mother unconscious. With the help of the neighbors, who came at once, Mrs. Reed was carried to a davenport in the living room, and a physician sent for.

The doctor soon arrived and said she was stricken with paralysis, and that he could do nothing for her. She passed away in an hour and a half after she was stricken, never having gained consciousness.

Mrs. Reed was past 79 years of age. She was born Oct. 6, 1839, in Marysville, Ohio.

The funeral will be delayed to the latter part of this week, awaiting the arrival of her son, living in California.
