After returning to the U.S., he obtained his B.A. degree from William Penn College in Oskaloosa in 1922. He also studied at Chicago Theological Seminary, the University of Southern California School of Religion, and the Auburn Theological Seminary in New York.

He was married to Sabron Lancaster Aug. 15, 1923. He served as principal of New Providence Academy and as acting director of Southland Institute near Helena, Ark., a school founded by Friends following the Civil War to provide education to children of former slaves.

The Rev. Mr. Reynolds also served pastorates in Lynnville, West Branch and Earlham, Iowa; Poplar Ridge and Clintondale, N.Y.; and West Newton and Valley Mills, Ind. He served interim pastorates in Minneapolis, Minn., and Denver, Colo.

Grinnell. He served as a parttime pastor for the Newburg and Chester churches. During his career, he attended numerous Friends meetings and conferences at the national and international level, as well as World Conference of Churches events.

He was known locally for his letters to the editor on peace subjects. Mayor Robert Anderson appointed him as Grinnell's "peace mayor"
