A PIONEER P

Charles A. Ridley, Resident of Grinnell in 1857, Dies in California February 16th

WAS A RESIDENT HERE SINCE YEAR OF 1857

Served in U. S. Cavalry During Civil War and Lived Long Years in Washington Twp.

Charles A. Ridley was born in Searsport, Maine, March 11, 1841. He came from that same sturdy English stock that produced the martyr, Bishop Ridley.

Owing to the death of his father Mr. Ridley had to make his own way in the world from early boyhood. At the age of 16 he came to Grinnell, Iowa, where he lived three years, then he went to Colorado, attracted by the newly discovered gold fields there, staked out a claim and engaged in mining. In 1861 he left his gold mine and enlisted in the army, serving in Troop I, 2d regiment of cavalry, U. S. Regular Army.

Under General Stoneman he participated in the famous ride around Richmond in 1862, and was with General Buford at the Battle of Gettysburg. Three times in battle his horse was shot under him, but he escaped unharmed, and in 1864 was honorably discharged with the rank of corporal. He was a member of the John R. Godfrey Post of the G. A. R. in Pasadena.

After the war was over he returned to Grinnell, Iowa, and on Feb. 16, 1866, was united in marriage to Maria Anna, daughter of John Brown, one of the best known pioneers of this part of Iowa. Mr. and Mrs. Ridley lived on their farm three miles south of Grinnell until 1900, when they retired from the farm and made their home in Grinnell. In 1906 they went to California.

Five children came to their home, Emma M., wife of C. P. Colegrove, President of Upper Iowa University, Fayette, Iowa; Julia A., wife of Dr. H. E. Combacker, Osceola, Wis.; Charles H., of Orland, Cal.; Ralph L. of Yakima, Wash., and a daughter who died in infancy.

Mr. and Mrs. Ridley were spared to each other for 55 years. On Feb. 16, 1921, the anniversary of their wedding he died in their home at 1079 N. Marengo Ave., Pasadena. Funeral services were conducted by Rev. J. J. Jones, pastor of the Pilgrim Congretational church.
