Was Grinnell Pioneer

There are many old friends in and near Grinnell who deeply regret the passing at her home in Pasadena of Mrs. Charles A. Ridley. Her death occurred Tuesday, March 12. Since the death of her husband three years ago she has been in rather poor health. Over two years ago she suffered from a stroke and since last November she has been confined to her bed.

Mrs. Ridley was the daughter of John Brown, one of Grinnell's earlier and most respected citizens. She was born in England and with her parents she emigrated to this country in 1852. They located at Kenosha, Wis., but in 1854 moved to Grinnell. Here she married Chas. A Ridley and here the family lived until seventeen years ago. Since that time her home has been in Pasadena.
