Obituary Of 6-#

Erederick Moritz Risse was born April 2, 1853 at Silver Creek, Wis where he grew to young manhood. At the age of 19 he started to learn the blacksmith trade. After mastering the trade, and looking for a location, he, with two neighborhood schoolmates as companions started for Iowa on foot. They stopped at New Hampton and worked on a farm for a while, from there they went to Grinnell and worked for some time at the Doolittle farm.

The blacksmith trade seemed to be his calling and for some time he worked at it for Mr. Sardine Stowe in Grinnell. From here he went to Newburg and built a shop and house and started in business for himself.

He met Edith Maxie Schroeder and they were married Sept. 30, 1879, making their home at Newburg at the newly prepared loca tion. He remained in business there until the spring of 1891 when he moved his family to a farm five miles northwest of Malcom. After ten years of farming near Malcom and Grinnell he moved to Grinnell where he worked at the Spaulding and Laros Buggy factories and various other works and has made Grinnell his home continually with the exception of short intervals in Minnesota and Wisconsin.

To this union were born six children, two of whom survive, four having died in infancy.

His wife passed away Jan. 17, 1915 after several years of failing health.

He was the oldest of a largefamily of whom only two brothers survive. For the past year he had visited and spent his time with a niece and a nephew, the Will Wagner and Rudolph Schmitz families of Antigo, Wis., and was planning on coming home to Iowa in several weeks after having made visits with his other relatives in Wisconsin.

On Thursday, Oct. 3 at the Rudolph Schmidt farm, while he and two small girls were bringing home the cows, he was attacked by a ram. He was taken to their home and a physician called immediately, but with all that medical science and loving hands could do, he passed into the eternal sleep at 6:25 p.m. less than an hour from the time of the attack from internal hemorrhage and shock, caused by a broken rib, punctured lung and ruptured viscera.

He had reached the age of 79 years, 7 months and 1 day. The deceased was confirmed in the Evengelical Lutheran church at Silver Creek, Wis. and was a member in that faith until he joined the Congregational church at Newburg and later transferred his membership to Grinnell.

On Saturday, Oct. 5th at 2:00 p.m., funeral services were held eight miles east of Antigo at Will Wagner home. The serv were conducted by Rev. Henry Freeling of the Congregatic church at Antigo where the ceased had attended some. It a most fitting and impressive vice. Vittum, a friend of Mr. Risse and his former pastor, gave one of his most splendid sermons. A quartet composed of E. L. York, E. G. Peterson, H. Dawkins and F. Tomasek rendered three selections, "Nearer My God to Thee," "Wonderful Peace" and "That Beautiful Land" in their usual splendid manner.

Interment was in the family lot at Ivy Hill cemetery at Malcom.
