This lady who cared for two homes during her life and who was always a hardworking, industrious woman, was born in Buffalo, New York, Dec. 25, 1841, the oldest of a family of five children. Her mother died when she was nine years old and it fell to her lot to help care for the other children thus early getting a glimpse of the duties that fall to the young mother.
