

Kellogg Loses 6-4 An Old Settler

Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon at the Christian church here for Thomas E. Roseman who died at his home Friday, January 1, at 11:30 of heart trouble. Burial was made in Our Silent City cemetery.

Thomas Edward Roseman, the third child of William and Elizabeth Roseman was born in Belmont county, Ohio, March 1, 1864, and was numbered among Jasper county's pioneers having lived here almost sixty-two years.

The family came to Durant, Iowa, when he was one year and six months old where they spent almost five years, then moved to a farm five miles west of Kellogg on Highway No. 6.

Here he grew to manhood and was occupied with farming. He was united in marriage to Miss Ida J. Peters of Kellogg February 10, 1892, and to this union three children were born, all of whom survive.

The first nine years of his married life were spent on the home farm, then he moved to Kellogg in June, 1901, where some time later he entered the civil service as a rural mail carrier in which capacity he served for a period of twenty-five years, retiring at the age of sixty-five.

He was a member of the Kellogg Christian church and was also affiliated with the local camp of M. W. A.

Surviving relatives include the wife, Mrs. Ida J. Roseman, three sons, Floyd of State Center, Lyle of Des Moines and Vernon at home; two grandchildren, Marjorie and Robert Roseman of State Center, and one brother, Ed Roseman, of Fairfield.
