Virs. Isabel 6-14 Rule Is Dead

Longtime Resident of Grinnell Passes Away April 6 at Her Home, 1410 Fourth Ave.

Mrs. Rule Lived a Long and Useful Life, Full of Acts of Kindness and Help

We chronicle today the death of Mrs. Isabel Turnbull Rule, who passed away April 6, after a long illness. Mrs. Rule was born near Elmira, Ill., Nov. 19, 1849. She was the daughter of James and Ann Mathewson Turnbull both of whom were born in Scotland.

Dec. 28, 1871, she was married to James Rule, also of Scotch ancestry, who lived near them. Mrs. Rule was the oldest daughter of a family of nine, one sister still living. Her brother, William Turnbull, also of Elmira, died here two years ago on the same day of the month, April 6.

Mr. and Mrs. Rule moved to Grinnell in 1881 and located on a farm about four miles northwest of Grinnell. Here they lived until her husband became a partner of William Miles in the hardware business in 1893, the firm being conducted under the name of Rule & Miles. During twenty years of her life she had been an invalid but had been able to take an interest in her family and had been as active in life as she could be. For three years she had been confined to her room.

The Rules were Presbyterians and she did not join here because she and her husband wished to retain their church connection with the Presbyterian ancestry.

A brother of James Rule, Alex Rule, attended Monmouth college and joined the Presbyterian ministry.

Mrs. Rule's death occurred at 8:46 Wednesday evening at her home at 1410 Fourth avenue.

She leaves to mourn her loss three sons and six daughters and four grandchildren.

The funeral will be held tomorrow, Saturday, afternoon at her late nome 1410 Fourth avenue, at 2 o'clock, conducted by Kev. Robert Inglis.
