Last Thursday evening Oct 5, Thomas I. Rutherford departed this life at his home near Chipman of an affection of the liver, being 44 years of age. The funeral was held from the home on Sunday at two o'clock p. m. Rev. James Robertson, pastor of the Waddington Scotch church, officiating, the burial being made in the new village cemetery.

Thomas Ingalls Rutherford was born at Antwerp, Jefferson County, March 22, 1861, the second son of James S. and Margaret Rutherford. At the age of five years he, with the family removed to Chester, Iowa, and later to Grinnell, Iowa, where twenty-five years of his life were spent. Jan. 13, 1892, he married Jane A. daughter of the late Thos. F. Young, coming east at that time. Mr. and Mrs. Rutherford ever afterward lived at the bride's home, buying the farm after Mr. Young's death about eight years ago.

While still a mere lad of 15 he joined the Congregational church at Chester, Iowa, this act denoting that religious trait in his character by which he was known as a firm adherent of the Christian faith and a good practicer of its cardinal virtues. Upon coming east to live he joined the church at Chipman, of which he was a faithful member and a good supporter. He is survived by his wife and aged father, one sister, Agnes, Mrs. Seth J. Pearce of Grinnell, Iowa, and four brothers, John of Chicago, George, Arthur and Ray of Grinnell, Iowa.

Mr. Rutherford was a quiet man, steadfast in his attachments, a very hard worker, successful in his business undertakings and a man of high integrity. His character was above reproach in every respect and he was regarded as a substantial member of the community. An unusually large number of friends gathered at the funeral in honor of his memory, the pastor preaching with very practical application from the message of God delivered by the Prophet Isaiah to King Hezekiah as found in II Kings 20-1: "Set thine house in order for thou shalt die and not live."-Madrid N. Y.) Herald.
