Body Will Reach Here Thursday Night—Funeral Services Friday.

Word received in Grinnell Saturday announced the death of J. H. Sanders griday night in Chowchilla, Calif., where he had been at the home of his son Edwin. Mr. Sanders and daugh-ter Annie went to California early in the spring. Edwin and Annie are ac-companying the body back to Grinnell and are expected here Thursday night. The funeral will be held Friday at the home, 313 East street, but more definite arrangements have not been made as yet.

Mr. Sanders was the last of the three Sanders Brothers who were closely associated with the up building of the Grinnell community almost from the arm first. Sanders and Lucius Sanders and for a long time the Sanders Bros. farm northwest of Grinnell was famount the whole countryside. As advancing years came on the three retired from the farm and moved to Grinnell. All three were unright and worthy men; of the sort who helped establish the ideals of Grinnell. The passing of the last of the three is worthy of more than a passing comment.

Last of Well Known Sanders Brothers Laid to Rest in Haselwood.

Joseph Howard Sanders was born in New Ipswich, N. H., July 20, 1836 and died in Chowchilla, Calif. June 15, 1922, lacking a month of being 86 years of age. He worked in the tinning and brass finishing business when a young man until the Civil Warduring which time he served the Unit. during which time he served the United States government in North Caro-lina in the comissary department. He was sent home on sick leave and in March 1864 near the close of the war came to Grinnell.

He was associated with two brothers and a sister in the hotel business and later engaged in farming on what was long known as the Sanders brothers' farm in Southwest Chester township farm in Southwest Chester township. He was married in 1860 to Betsic Tay-lor of Manchester, Vermont, and to this union were born three children: One, Harry, died in childhood. Mts. Sanders preceded her husband in death, having passed away August 21, 1912.

He was compelled to leave the farm, on account of his health in 1901 and then made his home in Grinnell. He is survived by his children Edwin Sanders, of Chowchilla, Calit., and Miss Annie Sanders, of Grinnell.

Funeral services were conducted Friday afternoon from the residence on East street, by Rev. C. A. Carman. Many friends were in attendance to pay a tribute or respect to his memory and to extend sympathy to the bereaved. reaved.
