zuma Mothers Club and attended the meetings faithfully until her health failed.

She was a long-time member of the Pythian Sisters and served as Most Excellent Chief. She worked willingly in other organizations and gave generously of her time and energy.

Mrs. Saunders was preceded in death by her husband in 1953.

She is survived by the three daughters; four grandchildren: Mrs. Jo Ann Putnam Hall of Fort Leonard Wood, Mo., Mrs. Jenice Willcutt Sanders of Fargo, N.
