The body looked so natural and life-like that none could believe that she was dead, but only soundly sleeping. All indications are that she passed off without even waking up.

The funeral was conducted from her late residence by her pastor, Elder J. S. Roth. Although she left no near relations, she had many warm friends as was demonstrated by the large number who were present at the fun-eral. Her mortal remains were laid to rest on February 4th in the beautiful Hazelwood.
