

Old Soldier Given G-H 7-8-1930 Military Funeral

Last Sunday taps were blown for one of Brooklyn's old soldiers. He did not live in Brooklyn and had not lived here for many years, nevertheless he was Brooklyn's soldier for he enlisted from Brooklyn in the 28th Iowa and now only Reuben Brennum remains of the boys who left Brooklyn in the days of '61.

The war record of Frederick Shine shows that he enlisted in Co. C of the 28th Iowa, Oct. 10, 1862, and was mustered out at Savannah, Georgia, July 31st, 1865.

Frederick Shine, 94, veteran of the civil war, died at his home at 208 North Tenth street, Thursday afternoon, death being due to the infirmities of age. He had been bedfast the last three years and nine months. Mr. Shine was born in Germany, September 15, 1836. He came to America with his parents when a child and they settled in Ohio. He was left an orphan at the age of 12 years and he remained with relatives in Ohio until he was of age when he came west to settle in Iowa in 1857.

He was married to Miss Hannah M. Fry on September 28, 1865. In 1883 Mr. and Mrs. Shine went to Huron, S. Dak., where they made their home until 1892 when they moved to a farm in Minnesota. They settled in Marshalltown in 1917. Mr. Shine had been a member of the Methodist Church since 1879. He is survived by his widow and two children, William and May Shine living at home. Two children preceded him in death.

Prayer services were held from the Pursel Funeral Home at five o'clock Saturday evening and the body was taken to Brooklyn for burial. Services were held at the Methodist Church in Brooklyn conducted by the Rev. Sylvester Ellis, of Marshalltown, with the Legion Post assisting. — Brooklyn Chronicle.
