The two men rushed to the site "There were long skid marks," Belden said, but somehow the car must have gotter out of gear because the motor was still running." Belden said he shut off the motor. His wife called an ambulance from Grin nell and later notified sheriff.

Shultz was apparently dear instantly, Belden stated. Belden added that no one moved the body until the authorities arrived. When the coroner, Dr W. M. Page of Montezuma, ar rived, he pronounced Shult dead. The body was remove to Grinnell and later taken t a funeral home at Brooklyn.
