Heman H. Sprague.

Heman H. Sprague was born at Estenburg, N. Y., April 4, 1857, and died at Grinnell, Ia., Sept. 2, 1916, aged 65 years, 4 months and 28 days.

The deceased was left fatherless at the age of 5 years and motherless at the age of 18. Out of a large family only two sisters are now living. Mrs. Minnie Kent of Manson, Ia., and Mrs. Lydia Dorsey of Nashua, N. H.

Mr. Sprague left his native state in 1879 and settled in Leadville, Colo., where he remained for two years. From there he removed to Ewart, Ia., where he lived until 1887, when he went to western Nebraska, where he remained two years, and from there he came to Grinnell in the spring of 1880 and this city has been his homes ever since.

He, was married at Ewart, Ia, on March 13, 1834, to Ella E. Farley, who had come with her parents from Ellenburg, N. Y., a short time before. Both parties to this contract had known each other all their lives. To this union were born three daughters, Mamie E., who died in infancy; Inall, and Lena May, who with their mother sincerely mourn the loss of a loving husband and a kind and indulgent father.
