## Helen Stickle Buried Here

Member of Pioneer Grinnell Family Dies At Galesburg, Illinois.

WAS ACCOMPLISHED MUSICIAN
AND MUSIC TEACHER.

Old Time Friends Join In Expression of Appreciation At Funeral

The burial of Helen A. Stickle in Hazelwood cemetery last Sunday brought back to Grinnell to attend the funeral two members of one of the time honored families of this city who have lived here and have been a very important part of the community. The Stickle family were natives of Ontario, Canada, but moved to Grinnell, Iowa, in the '60s. The following notice of Miss Stickle's death is taken from a Galesburg paper:

"Miss Helen A. Stickle, an accomplished musician, died at the home of her sister, Mrs. C. E. Quaife, 1008 North Cherry street. Wednesday evening at 7:15 o'clock. Her death resulted from pernicious anemia.

Miss Stickle had been in failing health for several years, but she was not taken critically ill until Monday.

She was born in Ontario, Canada, but when a child her parents moved to Grinnell, Iowa, where she spent the greater share of her life. Following the death of her parents she moved to Fort Dodge, Iowa, and about 10 years ago she came to Galesburg to make her home.

At Grinnell Miss Stickle taught piano lessons to children and established a city-wide reputation there for her ability. She was accomplished in various things.

Surviving are her two sisters, Mrs. C. E. Quaife, with whom she made her home, and Mrs. J. E. Bull, Calgary, Alberta, Canada. There are

Miss Stickle had retained her membership in the Methodist church at Fort Dodge Iowa.

Funeral services are to be held Friday afternoon at 2:30 at the home, 1008 North Cherry street, with Rev. Charles A. Carman officiating. Remains will be taken to Grinnell for burial."

The body reached Grinnell and funeral services were held Sunday afternoon at 2:30 in the Congregational church conducted by Rev. E. M. Vittum. Mr. Vittum spoke briefly of his acquaintance with the family and the deceased lady. Music was by Mrs. D. H. Snook and Mrs. Robert Bouma. Burial was in the family lot in Hazelwood.

Present to attend the funeral were Dr. and Mrs. C. E. Quaife and son with whom Miss Stickle has been living for ten years, of Galesburg, Illinois; Mrs. John E. Bull of Calgary, Canada; Mr. E. M. Williams of Ft. Dodge, Iowa and Prof. and Mrs. J. B. Lynn of Ames, Iowa, who were friends of the Bulls while living at Calgary a few years ago.

Miss Stickle was an accomplished musician and the writer's attention has been called by three people to the fact that they took their first music lessons under her and that she was a a most excellent teacher. This recalls that a large number of present Grinnell people were trained in music by this lady and all have spoken of her and her work in the kindest of words.

The funeral services at Galesburg were conducted by Rev. C. A. Carman, whom so many Grinnell people know so favorably.
