STICKLE.—In this city, on the morning of the 20th inst., at 3 o'clock, of Cerebro-Spinal Meningitis, Mollie E. Stickle, aged 20 years 6 months, daughter of Charles S. and Nancy Stickle, after a very severe illness of twelve days:
