MERLIN C. STOKER

Merlin Carl Stoker, son of Charles and Ella Roth Stoker, was born Nov. 16, 1918, in Lincoln township, Poweshiek county, Iowa. He had spent his entire life in this community, where he farmed, and for the last four years had been associated with the Empire Oil Co.

A member of St. John's Lutheran church in lowa county, he had held numerous church offices and was a member of the board of elders and the school board when the new school building was built in 1954. He had also served as a member of the Guernsey Consolidated school board, following his graduation from that school in 1934.

May 30, 1943, he married Edna Mae Burke. Four daughters were born to the couple.
From 1941 to 1945 he served in the U. S. Army, attaining the rank of captain. He received many citations for service, including a silver star, three bronze stars, three purple hearts, the Presidential Unit citation, the combat infantry rifleman's badge and the French Croix de guerre, for exceptional bravery under fire.

He was a member of Morrison-Schrader post of the American Legion at Deep River. Members of the post provided an excort and military rites at funeral services.

Merlin lost his life in a boating accident May 15 at Cameron Lake in Ontario, Canada, where he had gone on a
