She also taught the first school in Holt country, and kept the first post office, as Mr. Cook was blind at that time and this duty fell to her lot to perform, which she did in an efficient manner.

She was married to <u>Charles C.</u> Stone also a Civil War veteran, Nov. 5th, 1924, who preceded her in death June 6, 1926.

She leaves to mourn 8 children, 21 grandchildren, 29 great grandchildren, and one great, great grandchild, besides a large number of friends and acquaintances. Six grandsons acted as pall bearers.
