## Montezuma Newspaper Man Dies Monday in Local Hospital David Sutherland, Sr., publisher of the Montezuma Republican for the past 30 years, died sud-

er of the Montazuma Republican for the past 30 years, died suddenly Monday afternoon, July 5th, at about 3:30 at a Grinnell hospital. He was 63 years old. Death followed hospitalization for about two weeks here and at Des Moines, though his many friends thought that he was responding to treatment, and had hoped that he would soon be discharged from the hospital. The deceased is survived by his wife, one son, David Jr., who was co-publisher with his father, and one daughter, Mrs. Wayne Hutchinson, all of Montezuma. There are also three grandchildren.
