Fred Griffith, 85, of Brooklyn, died Monday, July 19, 2004, at St. Francis Manor, Grinnell.

Funeral services for Fred Griffith were held at 10:30 a.m. Friday, July 23, 2004, at St. Patrick's Catholic Church, Brooklyn. Fr. Brian J. Shepley officiated the service. Interment was in Calvary Cemetery.

Fred Griffith, the son of Floyd Griffith and Lula Davenport Griffith, was born February 18, 1919, in Valpen, Indiana.

The family moved to a farm north of Malcom in 1925 where they farmed. Fred graduated from Malcom High School in 1936. Fred served with the United States Army from January 1943 to November 1945.

He moved to Brooklyn in 1941, and on September 1, 1941, Fred married Frances A. Leeper at St. Patrick's Rectory in Brooklyn. They were the parents of 12 children: Carolyn Jo, Dan, Dick, Sue, Shorty, Kris, Anne, Jim, Fred, John, Dale and Sally.

Fred was a trucker most of his life, and he was also a livestock buyer.
