**Clarence Duvico Talbert**  
Elder Clarence Duvico Talbert, 65, who served as minister of Liberty Primitive Baptist Church in Grinnell, died of a heart attack Thursday, April 6, at his home in Blakesburg.

Funeral services were conducted April 11 at Knedler Funeral Home in Blakesburg, with Elder Russell Key of Moberly, Mo., officiating, assisted by Elder Fred Phipps of Friendship Manor, Grinnell. Vocalist was John Taylor, and pallbearers were Lyle Talbert, Matt Goode, Virgil Ellis, Mike Fisher and Lee Rolfe. Burial was in Fugate Cemetery, Greentop, Mo., officiated by Elder Harold Taylor of Milan, Mo., and Elder Russell Key.

He was born Aug. 13, 1923, the son of Bertie and Henrietta Cecil Talbert. Following his mother's death when he was 7, he lived in rural Greentop with a first cousin, Henry Wayman. He completed eighth grade but left school because of an eye

injury.

He was married to Dorothy Louise Paris in Kirksville, Mo., June 8, 1941. He was ordained by Liberty Primitive Baptist Church in Grinnell in 1948 and served churches in Missouri and Iowa.

He and his family lived in various communities in Iowa where he worked as a farmhand. He purchased a farm north of Blakesburg in the mid-1950s and worked at Morrell Meat Packing Plant in Ottumwa. He later drove buses for the Blakesburg school system. Mr. Talbert last worked for a feed and grain dealer.

He is survived by his wife, Dorothy of Blakesburg; his children, Donna McKim of Kirksville, Isabelle Cappuccino of New Tripoli, Pa., Marguerite Slaven of Grinnell, David of Duncan, Neb., Russell of Des Moines, John of Blakesburg and Becky Ellis of Albia; 11 grandchildren; two great-grandchildren; and his brothers and sisters, Ray of Kirksville, Florence Britt of Las Vegas, Nev., Ora of Greentop, Marie Parsons of Kirksville, Lee of California, Clyde of Davenport, Almeda March of Wilmouthsville, Mo., and Woodrow of Blakesburg.
