The body of Freeman C. Taylor, former wellknown resident of Grinnell in the early days, wlfo died in a hospital in Kalamazoo, Mich., on May 31, was brought to Grinnell today by his two sons, Charles Taylor, of Spencer, Ind., and Ward Taylor of Davenport. Funeral services were held from the Congregational church at 2:30 o'clock this afternoon, conducted by Rev. E. M. Vittum. Interment was in Hazelwood. Mr. Taylor was born in Brattlebore, Vt., in October, 1835, and would have been 84 years of age at his next birthday. When he was a boy he came with his parents to Geneseo, Ill., and in 1868 came to the new community of Poweshiek county to make his home. The railroad had just been built through Grinnell at that time.

He settled first on a farm near Newburg but about 1878 moved to Grinnell and either farmed in this vicinity or lived in town until 1896, when the family moved to Seattle for seven Haven, Mich., where the shrdluetap years. Later they went to South Haven, Mich., where the home has been since that time. Mr. Taylor was in robust health until a year ago, but has been failing since that time.

He is survived by his wife, the two sons who accompanied the body to Grinnell, and two step-sons, Frank Sawin of Chicago, and W. J. Sawin of Platte, Neb. Mrs. Taylor is with Frank Sawin in Chicago and was unable to make the trip to Grinnell. One son, Lee Taylor, preceded his father in death.
